#### Message from Our Foundation Chairman

The American Space Museum is starting a quarterly newsletter to share with our friends, donors, sponsors and space buffs what is going on at the museum. The Museum was founded in 1988 when a local physician wrote to the Titusville City Council suggesting a project to preserve space history and to honor men and women associated with America's space program. With a downtown redevelopment program in progress to enhance the riverfront, the suggestion was welcomed by the council and the Titusville Community Redevelopment Agency. The idea resulted in the formation of the U.S. Space Walk of Fame Foundation, a non-profit organization.

Led by space pioneers, community leaders and former space workers, foundation officials cooperated with the city which provided park infrastructure while the foundation oversaw monument development,

plaques, mission logo markers and other space related items to complete the space themed park on the Indian River across from the Kennedy Space Center. From the monuments grew the museum in 2001.

Our Museum is 6,000 square feet with more than 530 artifacts on display. In this quarters chairman's message I would like to introduce myself, share a little history of our museum, share our current programs, and request your help.

I am Larry Ostarly the current Chairman of American Space Museum. My wife Elva and I have lived on the Space Coast since 1980, where we raised our three children. I transferred from Sunnyvale, California with Lockheed to support the Navy's Fleet Ballistic Missile program as a test engineer and eventually transferred to Kennedy Space Center to support the shuttle as an Orbiter Test Conductor where I had the privilege of participating in numerous shuttle launches. The last decade of my career was spent with Amentum leading several of our NASA contracts. My introduction to the ASM was through Lee Solid a retired Rocketdyne Executive who was heavily involved in Saturn V's engine development and sending men to the moon. My desire is to see our museum thrive as we bring our museum and programs to the community.

The museum is a non-profit that provides a history of our space program. We are located in downtown Titusville next to the Playhouse. Today the museum focuses on the Mercury, Gemini, Apollo and Shuttle Programs with the majority of our artifacts being from that era. Our goal is to move forward with the future as the nation moves towards habitation of the moon and Mars with the Artemis program in partnership with commercial companies. We live in an amazing time with Space X launching 50 plus times a year from the Space Coast and with Blue Origin just around the corner. Space has never been more exciting.

Our newsletter will provide updates on our programs and the museum. Our webcast show "Stay Curious" produced by Marq Marquette and Marty Winkel has done more than 900 broadcasts. Please tune in weekly when Marq hosts guest speakers and shares Space Trivia, astronaut birthdays and backyard astronomy. You can watch at www.youtube.com/americanspacemuseum. Our STEM Science program led by Darin Roberts "Build-A-Brain Workshops" has hosted 4759+ elementary students throughout Brevard County where Darin has shared science with enthusiasm and ignites the children's imagination. The museum galleries focus on Mercury, Gemini, Apollo, Space Shuttle, Female Astronauts and the Cape's contributions to space exploration. We have had 16,500 visitors so far this year. With some coming as far away as Holland and Melbourne, Australia. One of our visitors said he found out about us on the "Travel Channel". We are open to the public from 10 to 5 Monday thru Saturday.

The museum is a non-profit with 100% of our revenue being generated by attendance, Members of the Museum, donations, community events, memorabilia auctions, grants, and sponsors. Our supporters are key to our success we currently have 100 paid members with a goal of 200 for 2024, consider becoming a Member of the Museum. I look forward to a great Florida tourist season and ask you to keep my Tampa Bay Buccaneers in your prayers. Thank you, Connie


#### American Space Museum's "ASM Gives Back" Program: Free Admission for Different Groups Each Month **A Community Initiative to Show Appreciation**


Some of the workshops that are offered include:

The Stay Curious videopodcast has become much more than intended 4 years ago. It started in March 2020 when I told Karan Conklin that I think I can put some short videos on Facebook live, to show our supporters that we were not going to lay down and do nothing during the Covid-19 pandemic shutdown.

Today we have more than 900 episodes, with half of them on YouTube where we are making a little bit of money. We have many regulars who say that Stay Curious helped them through the "cooped up" months of 2020.

For those who don't know, Stay Curious has become a "TV news-style" production using a program called "Streamlabs" that merges the graphics and live broadcast together. Marty Winkel has been behind the console since we were taught by our "Trekkie Tekkie" Jessica Galloway.

One Stay Curious fan, Georgia onion and peanut farmer Gary Jarel, stopped by the museum this past Spring and brought the ASM staff a box of delicious Vidalia onions he grew to say thank you!

I asked Gary to be on a Stay Curious episode his next visit this past summer, and he enlightened everyone about how GPS satellites and data collecting are a mainstay in today's 21st Century farming.

Gary is just one of more than 60 people who we've had a "conversation" with on the video podcast that usually has 50-80 people a day watching. The flux of viewership is something IT manager Bruce Jacobs, Karan and I are trying to figure out, and it ranges for Apollo engineer John Tribe (300 views) to never lower than 40, and show content doesn't seem to be much of a factor. Among those interviewed this 2023 so far include European Space Agency communicators with the International Space Station; Astronaut wife Marie Fullerton; six astronauts, 100-year old W.O. Brown, a NASA engineer; local space food expert Gary Shuttle and bunches of Shuttle Era workers and executives.

We are fortunate to have attracted three very respected space leaders for monthly programs: Kennedy Space Center Visitors Complex senior educator Nick Thomas; Shuttle Orbiter Processing Facility manager Terry White; and Shuttle Payloads expert Mikey Haddad. In February we lost our 90-year-old NASA icon, Hugh Harris, and we are pleased that Stay Curious is a forum to continually promote Hugh's legacy, as well as all that of space workers.


One of the special guests we've had on Stay Curious is former KSC director Jay Honeycutt. Mr. Honeycutt recently did an episode on his Apollo days as a simulation manager. We are working together on a special program that will be called "Jay Honeycutt's Brief History of Human Spaceflight." He wants ASM to market this piece which would be used by NASA human resources department for new hires.

So we are very blessed to have so many "VIP eyes" on this humble Stay Curious program. Believe me, the program has benefited from volunteer Marty Winkel, who has been beside me nearly every episode.

Together, the ASM staff is striving to improve our Stay Curious content and find creative ways to reach a larger audience in a heavily podcast-populated world of social media.

We thank everyone for their continued support, financially, with guests, or sharing our social media pages.

The Museum's Collection

The American Space Museum's collection contains artifacts covering the beginnings of the U.S. space program through the current day. They came to the museum from a variety of sources including NASA and its contractors and space workers. Some items have been loaned to the museum for exhibit.




Our database contains records for more than 4400 items and we have around 530 artifacts on exhibit. The items that are not on exhibit are at a storage facility generously provided by Parrish Medical Center. This location also contains many items that have not yet been evaluated and processed. This is an ongoing effort.

This work involves determining if an item is appropriate for the museum's collection, documenting the provenance (ownership and history) of the object and understanding how the item should be used to further the museum's mission.

In future issues of the newsletter we will highlight some of the interesting items that we have on exhibit.

#### Grandmother's Close Call: How to Protect Yourself from Scams



Pam, a grandmother, received a distressing call from someone claiming to be her grandson. The caller said, "Grandma, help! I'm in trouble," and hung up. Minutes later, another call came from a supposed lawyer representing her grandson. The lawyer informed Pam that her grandson was in legal trouble and needed \$8,000 in fines and fees paid by 2 p.m. that day. He stressed the importance of secrecy for her grandson's safety and provided a phone number to send the money.

Alarmed, Pam rushed to the bank to withdraw the requested amount. The observant bank teller noticed her nervousness and inquired if everything was alright. Pam assured her she was fine but asked how to send cash using a cell phone. The alert teller involved the bank manager, who spoke with Pam and offered to investigate the matter.

The investigation revealed that Pam was a target of scammers who had been preying on elderly individuals in the area. Pam was relieved to find her grandson safe and grateful to the bank staff and authorities for preventing her from falling victim to the scam.

This incident highlights the importance of vigilance against scams. Here are some red flags to watch out for:

- Urgency and Secrecy: Scammers often create a sense of urgency and demand secrecy to prevent victims from verifying the situation.
- Unusual Payment Methods: Requests for payment through apps like Cash App, Zelle, or Venmo, gift cards, or other unconventional methods are suspicious.
- **Personal Information Requests:** Never share personal information like social security numbers, bank details, or credit card information with unknown parties.
- Vague Job Descriptions: Be wary of job offers with overly attractive or vague descriptions.
- Poor Grammar and Spelling: Scams often contain grammatical errors and typos.
- Unsolicited Offers: Be cautious of unsolicited job offers or money-making opportunities.
- **Pressure Tactics:** Scammers often pressure victims to act quickly without proper consideration.

Protect yourself and your loved ones by staying informed about scams and exercising caution. Remind older family members and friends to be wary of unsolicited calls or messages. Encourage them to never share personal information or send money to unknown individuals.

Financial institutions have trained fraud departments to help identify and prevent scams. Don't hesitate to reach out to them for assistance. Remember, it's always better to be safe than sorry when it comes to protecting your hard-earned money.
